2. DECLARATION OF INTEREST

None declared.

3. FLINTSHIRE YOUTH SERVICES

Representatives attending:

The Chair and members welcomed A. Bell & A. Thomas FCC Education and Youth and also three young ladies who attend Treuddyn Youth Club – Jess, Nia and Demi.

The Youth Service have been taking young people by mini bus from Deeside to the 'Chill Factor' in Manchester during the Summer break. It is an opportunity for the young people to be involved in the skills industry – Hospitality, Estate Agent and Travel – and the opportunities within these sectors.

The daily session would start in the morning talking about mental and physical well being, the pm session would be the ski session.

The three young ladies spoke about the opportunity they have been given and without the support of the Youth Service this is something they would not have been able to afford to do. The course has given them the confidence to try new things and most importantly supporting and encouraging each other.

They are hoping to complete stage 2 which would offer possible apprenticeships with the 'Snow Camp' experience; Skiing and tutoring. They have enjoyed the experience very much and are fund raising to help towards the cost of the next stage of training which costs £300 pp.

AB: "The bigger picture is getting young people involved to get a qualification in sport and fitness which has to

improve your mental well being. They are raising as much as they can with consistent fund raising which will contribute to their place.

We would like to thank Treuddyn C.C for the invitation this evening and being given the opportunity to talk about how opportunities like this are so important for the young people. Any grant awarded does not go to an individual it goes into the FCC Youth Service account to be used for the specific activity".

Members thanked the youth leaders and young ladies for coming along this evening and talking about their experience.

It was also put to the young ladies if they could update TCC when they have completed stage 2 and share their experience.

It was agreed in principle a grant of £300 to the Youth Club in the October meeting on confirmation the grant is not paid to an individual. It was carried that a grant of £300 is awarded to FCC Youth Services towards the next stage of the course.

5. INSTALLATION OF CCTV – QUEEN STREET PLAY AREA

Cllr. A. Marshall invited Treuddyn Village Hall trustees to the November meeting on behalf of TCC. The purpose of the meeting is for the trustees to discuss with members their thoughts regarding the CCTV installation.

TCA has offered a steel container but unfortunately is not suitable for the CCTV equipment.

RC: "Do we have any alternatives for the CCTV?".

AM: "There would be an extra cost to install extra street lights and run underground cabling; Information could possibly be downloaded from a cabinet.

Installation of CCTV cameras on Hafan Deg would not give any view inside the pod".

The outcome of the meeting in November will determine the decision regarding the installation.

6. COUNCIL AND COMMUNITY INFORMATION / PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

It was discussed the importance of a Community Council being open and transparent.

It was an excellent example this evening were TCC invited Flintshire Youth Services and three young people who attend the youth club to the meeting. Wales is the 3rd best in the World at recycling thanks to residents, Councils and Welsh Government investment. The valuable recyclate can be reused and brings businesses to Wales, the food waste creates extremely valuable electricity and liquid fertiliser. From April 2024 all workplaces in Wales will need to separate their waste for recycling. The Council needs to increase the amount of recycled waste collected to reach its target which has slipped since COVID and it would be great if everyone took part.

Last week in the Senedd, during First Ministers Questions, I raised questions about flooding, asking for clear information and mapping of landowner responsibility, flood prevention, and what services are available. Landowners must take responsibility for keeping their ditches, drains and culverts clear, ditches next to roads are often the landowners responsibly under riparian law not the councils, they are responsible for highway gullies. The Council may have kept them clear at one time with regular maintenance but following over a decade of cutbacks and inflationary pressures, it is left to landowner responsibility. The council is not obliged to provide sandbags and their policy states they do not provide sandbags to individual properties when there is a flood, instead, they use sandbags to protect groups of residents, for example by diverting the path of flowing water, and directing it towards gullies and manholes. Often the gullies are full and cannot take the extra water, so it is best to prevent it flooding onto the highway in the firsts place by keeping ditches and culverts clear. The First Minister said he would follow it up.

20 mph roll out. Speeding was one of the biggest issues we would get complaints about when I was a community and County Council member. I have been raising concerns with Welsh Government about the way it has been implemented. In my experience as a previous Cabinet member for highways, the last speed limit review took five years to draw up traffic, regulation, orders, advertise, consult and deliver. There were anomalies then, there always are. I have asked The Deputy Minister to meet with Flintshire Council to help resolve issues. Several meetings have taken place between FCC, councils collectively and WG. Councils as highway authorities have asked for time for the new speeds to settle before making changes based on the exceptions criteria. Welsh Government are working with local highway authorities on how the guidance can be applied in different parts of Wales and to support councils to address obvious anomalies.

A section of the A5104 at Coed Talon and Pontybodkin has been made 20 mph because of the ribbon development of houses, the pedestrian crossing, play areas and businesses. Many people walk between the two play areas in Pontybodkin and Coed Talon, and to the railway line permissive bridleway. Many complaints have been received that people speed through the village but just slow down for the speed camera. The speed camera was put in place many years ago as a result of a child being killed on the road. In Pontybodkin, a village green has been created with the coal truck, pedestrian crossing and noticeboard to make people aware it is a village centre but people still speed.

Renewable energy is so important in our fight against climate change and for sustainability. Grŵp Llandrillo in Rhyl will soon be opening a fantastic £13m engineering facility with a 65% contribution from Welsh Government, working with RWE to train apprentices in wind turbine maintenance. I helped ensure that it went ahead when there were a few issues and have pleased to see it develop. I have been raising questions in the Senedd with National Grid and Scottish Power who own the local network about improving grid capacity in North Wales.

Although not devolved to Wales, broadband is another issue I am trying to resolve. Bangor university are at the forefront of developing new technology and I recently supported a bid for Wrexham and Flintshire business to lead on Creative arts and IT as well as advanced technology in a cross-government bid.

Winter can be a particularly tough time for ailments and health services come under pressure which is why residents are encouraged to choose wisely where to go. A pharmacist can help with many ailments. If you have an injury that is not serious you can go to a minor injury unit instead of going to an and accident and emergency department by dong this they can concentrate on those with serious and life threatening conditions. Mold minor injury is open 8 am to 6 pm Monday to Friday and you can visit for burns and scalds (minor less than 3%), ear and eye injury (minor), facial (nor wounds that need suturing), minor falls, removal of small foreign bodies, minor head injuries, minor limb injuries, sprains/fractures of limbs and simple wounds, not manipulation of fractures or dislocation. X-rays are Monday to Fridays 9 am to 4 pm (closed for lunch between 12.30 and 1.30 pm) tel 03000 850 006 One of my earliest campaigns was preventing the closure of Mold Hospital minor injury unit and I raised £5,000 towards the X-ray machine with the help of Treuddyn resident when I was Chair of Flintshire Council 10 years ago.

Welsh Government are investing in more health courses in North Wales. Wrexham University have a fantastic new department with support of Betsi Cadwaladr University Health board and the Welsh Ambulance service. There are various nursing courses, training for paramedics, nutritional and dietetics, occupational health, speech and language therapy and physiotherapy. I was really pleased to be shown round and know many people who have recently made a career change to nursing. Coleg Llandrillo offer higher education certificates to upskill healthcare support workers and help them on a pathway to pursue nursing careers. Costs are covered as are also possibly childcare costs, Courses are hybrid running from Rhos on Sea and Wrexham, some can be online only for those that may struggle to travel. From September 2024, Bangor will be launching its first medicine programme where students will be able to complete their entire medical degree programme in North Wales.

I chair a Senedd cross party group on public transport. The rising cost of living following a decade of austerity has impacted on all public services included health, education, housing and public transport. Welsh Government have put an extra £46m into sustaining buses but passenger numbers need to increase to make them more sustainable. There is currently a campaign to increase passenger numbers. It would be great to increase services but we currently need to sustain the ones we have got. The LT7 Treuddyn bus should hopefully be fine, I campaigned to keep a bus to the village after funding had been cut for all services. The bus you have is one that was funded by Welsh Government and is owned by FCC, run by P & O Lloyd.

I recently met with Transport for Wales, Network rail and transport police. More trains will be rolled out on the North Wales lines to increase capacity, they are unfortunately taking longer than expected. I was originally told by the end of 2023 but now it will before the end of 2024. Safety improvements are being made to Gwersyllt station by Network Rail to support the introduction of increased services between Wrexham and Bidston. If you see anything happening on the network or ever feel unsafe, you can text the transport police on 61016.

I also chair a Senedd cross party group on animal welfare. Many of the animal rescue centres are full with animals needing rehoming. If you are looking to have a pet, but concerned about holidays, or whether you can cope, fostering is a really good idea. It is also really important to match pets to owners, depending on their breed and nature. Cats protection rescue in Wrexham, Almost Home dog rescue in Nercwys and North Clwyd Animal Rescue in Holywell are always looking for homes for pets and donations.

Last month in the Senedd, I attended the Building Communities Trust 'Wales Community Assets Index'



virtual Launch event. This research uncovered 102 previously unidentified 'Less Resilent Areas' across Wales.

It shows 'that communities with fewer places to meet, a less engaged and active community and poorer connectivity to the wider economy, experience significantly different social and economic outcomes compared to communities possesing more of these assets' and that 'Communities with fewer of these assets have higher rates of unemployment, residents often do not have qualifications and experience limiting long-term illnesses than both areas typically regarded as experiencing deprivation which do have those assets and Wales as a whole. They also have lower levels of community activity and receive lower levels of funding from both the state and charitable funders despite their social challenges'

In the same week, I opened the Welsh Conservative Debate on Community Assets, emphasising that enabling Wales will require the development of a long term, overarching communities strategy to help empower local people and establish 'asset based community development' as a key principle within community development.

Unlocking both 'people' and 'physical' assets, empowering the people of the community and using existing community strengths to build sustainable communities for the future is vitally important.

Although the motion passed, this was with an amendment, and I remain concerned that we are still not on the correct path to deliver for communities across Wales.On September 17th a default 20mph speed limit was introduced across Wales.

These changes on our roads have proved hugely unpopular, with 450,000+ people having signed a petition against them.

Last month in the Senedd Chamber, I questioned the Labour Deputy Minister, Lee Waters MS, who has become the driving force behind Wales' 20mph default speed limit. I asked what policy analysis the Welsh Government undertook before inplementing this, challenged him over the discretion local authorities have been granted to change the limit

and quoted a Flintshire County Councillor who told me 'Welsh Government don't appear to have learnt any lesson from the pilot' in Buckley.

Referring to the Welsh Government's claim that road deaths and cyclist numbers killed in road traffic accidents have fallen in Spain since it introduced a 30 km/h (18.6mph) speed limit on most of its roads in 2019, I also quoted the statement by the Spanish Interior Minister that there were more road deaths and cyclist fatalities in 2022 that in 2019, the last pre-pandemic year without mobility restrictions there.

People support 20mph speed limits outside schools, playgrounds or other locations where this is supported by local communites, but a blanket roll-out is quite frankly ludicrous.

The Welsh Government need to listen to the public and reverse this draconian policy.





Cllr Allan Marshall

Hello, it is now 18 months since I was elected to be your County Councillor. This period has been a steep learning experience for me trying to find out how the County Council works (and does not work) for me and you the residents. There have been some successes and disappointments along the way, and I am quickly learning who can and can't help me.

As an Independent Councillor I am a member of the Independent Group of Councillors that are the main 'Opposition'

to the Administration Labour and Liberal Parties. Our motto is 'People before Politics'. When dealing with any of our residents we have no knowledge if they voted for us nor what their political allegiance is. That's how it should be, and we try to help all residents as best as we can.

All Councillors sit on Scrutiny Committees where we scrutinise reports produced by the Council Officers by asking probing questions to get clarification and seeking improvements on performance. I am a member of the Corporate Resources Overview and Scrutiny and the Governance and Audit Committees that deal with the Council's financial matters. We are usually notified of the Agenda and Documentation pack about a week before the meeting and we need to read and prepare the documentation before the meeting. The pack for the last meeting I attended was 156 pages long so it is not an easy task to undertake.

I am also Vice Chair of the Climate Change Committee where consideration is given to the Council's aims of reaching 'Net Zero' through a combination of reducing carbon-based energy, expanding renewable energy generation and carbon-capture.

All Council meetings and associated documentation can be accessed at Flintshire.public-i.tv/core/portal/home where you can watch live or recorded meetings.

The 20mph speed limits were introduced on 17 September 2023 on all 'restricted roads' throughout Wales unless there were exceptions applicable to some roads. The Welsh Government is covering all the

costs that the County Councils incurred. However, it has not been established if they will cover the costs of replacing the defaced signs we see everywhere resulting from the protests.

Apparently, the Council officers are taking a 'cautious approach' to where the 20mph should apply. There are some places where it is appropriate and others that do not seem appropriate.

In the October 2023 County Council Meeting one of my Independent Councillor Colleagues asked a question about the 'undemocratic' introduction of the 20mph limits. The Council Leader effectively responded that we live in a democracy and that the Labour and Plaid Cymru manifestos both stated that they would introduce a 20mph limit. Anybody voting for a Labour or Plaid Cymru candidate in the 2021 Senedd elections therefore voted for the 20mph limit and due to the democratic voting process, anybody voting for any other candidate or party would just have to accept the outcome of the election. I think the lesson is - be very careful what you vote for.

Potholes are a recurring issue on our roads and pavements. Repairs appear to be temporary and need redoing every year. There is a saying that goes 'The man who only has a hammer thinks everything is a nail!'. Using the same ineffective repair techniques is a waste of time and money so more effective methods are needed. A Wepre Councillor and I have been in discussions with a company that has a patented technique that is being used by other Councils. Their method leaves the surface smooth and sealed and will last longer than the current method that converts 'pot-holes' into 'pot-bumps'. We are attempting to identify how the company can become a Flintshire County Council supplier of machinery and/or pot-hole repair services.

Recycling and Refuse Collection are things we take for granted and only become aware of them when things go wrong - a bit like your telephone or broadband. The Welsh Government has set recycling targets for all Councils to achieve. The 2022/23 target is that 64% of everything collected over the two-week collection period is recyclable (contents of the blue and silver bags, glass and food boxes) so the black bin should be 36% of what is collected. If these targets are not met, then the Welsh Government can impose an Infraction Charge on the Council per tonne of excess non-recyclable waste.

Flintshire had the third highest recycling rate in Wales and Wales was the third highest recycling country in the World. However, since Covid, recycling rates in Flintshire has dropped and the Council is facing an Infraction Charge of £663,000 that will effectively be paid from the Council Tax income. The officers are reporting that during random inspections some black bins contain 50% of food waste. The target for 2024/25 will increase to 70% so we all need to make every effort to recycle as much as possible.

The Council officers recently announced that the award of a new vehicle leasing contract has been delayed and the existing contract had been extended using the same vehicles. I understand that fourteen vehicles broke down last week leading to severe disruption of refuse and recycling collections in Flintshire.

The energy crisis is affecting us all and higher energy costs often means choosing between 'eating and heating'. You may be aware of government adverts on TV and radio about 'turning the flow temperature down to 60 degrees C'. Easy to say, but is it easy to do? Yes it is, and the method varies with each boiler. The 'normal' operating temperature for central water is between 70C and 80C and the reason is that the home is heated quickly when it is turned on first thing in the morning and in the evening. The boiler will be working flat out during these periods and will not be operating very efficiently.

Condensing boilers are most efficient when they work at lower temperatures that allow the control electronics inside to reduce the amount of gas consumed. When first turned on they are full on, and clouds of steam can be seen coming out of the flue. When the operating temperature is reached the boiler 'modulates' the flame and the amount of steam will reduce. If the boiler is producing lots of steam all the time it is on, then it is not operating efficiently.

The answer is to turn down the Central Heating 'flow temperature' on the boiler (usually indicated by a radiator symbol). Some boilers have digital displays and others just have a control knob with markers. The government recommends turning it down to 60C to save £100 per year. There is no right or wrong figure, and the objective is for you to be 'comfortable' with the warmth and cost. I would recommend turning it down slowly until it is 'uncomfortable' and then then turn it back up again until it is 'comfortable' again. It is all under your control after all.

Most homes have room thermostats, and some have radiator thermostatic valves. Setting them up can be tricky. Some use the thermostat as an on/off switch whilst others set them to a day and night temperatures and the heating comes on and off intermittently. There are varying opinions on whether it is best to have

the heating on intermittently. The introduction of smart meters and access to historical gas and electricity consumption allows the user to determine what works best for them.

I have turned down our central heating water flow temperature to be around 40C and achieved a 29% reduction in gas consumption in the first year. It took less than a minute to do and we are saving energy daily with no noticeable change in comfort.

3D. A few years ago, I became interested in 3D design and printing and thought I had become quite good at it – until I met with one of our residents, Arty Benjumeda who blew my mind with what he is making. I have asked Arty to help me with holding an 'Introduction to 3D design and printing' session at Hafan Deg to give residents the opportunity of seeing what it involves.

Flooding is an issue due to Climate Change. I recently went on a tour of parts of Treuddyn with our Streetscene Supervisor to see some of the local issues we have with ditches, culverts and gullies, and footpaths. I pointed out many blocked culverts that are causing storm water to be diverted out of the ditches onto the roads and then causing severe flooding on our roads. It was acknowledged that ditches, culverts, and gulley maintenance has been neglected for many years. Government funding cutbacks did not help.



For some time, FCC has been trying to recruit a drainage officer. The officer has now been employed and will be responsible for identifying problem area and solutions for Streetscene, or other Contractors, to implement. I was told that all the culverts along Ffordd y Rhos have been jetted and are now clear (I will confirm this week). However, a blockage has been found at the footpath near Ebenezer Chapel (now marked in blue) and Streetscene are to return to dig it out and investigate further.

We went up Ffordd y Blaenau and past Cae Hic to Llanfynydd and saw many blocked culverts that

need attention as they are causing damage to the road surface and making them dangerous. The gulley opposite Five Kennels needs cleaning since it closes the road during heavy rainfall.

We went to Llanfynydd Road traffic lights and discussed the issues causing the regular flooding there. The rainwater from many acres of land is having to pass through what looks like a 6" pipe and then through a single otter gate that gets blocked with large pieces of hedge cuttings causing water to back up onto the road and blocking it. A relatively simple solution was discussed and will be considered by FCC.

I raised the issues we have with ditches, culverts, and gullies at a Council meeting recently. After the meeting the FCC Chief Executive asked me to send him details of the issues we have. I forwarded two reports that I had previously prepared relating to Ffordd y Rhos/Ffordd y Gilrhos, and to Llanfynydd Road Traffic Lights. He found the information very useful, and he has accepted my invitation to come up to Treuddyn for a tour of our issues.

I am a practical hands-on Engineer and am prepared to do some work myself instead of waiting for a busy person to do it for me. I have just bought some surveying equipment to do some rudimentary surveying of the ditches, culverts and gullies to establish locations, conditions, and levels as a basis for identifying further work. Any help from residents with surveying experience would be appreciated.

We also discussed the state of potholes along the Corwen Road near Minnis Dell and the footpath between Treuddyn and Coed Talon. Remedial works will be incorporated into Streetscene's schedule.




